It is the mission of the Salem Schools to educate all students in a safe environment. Our school will provide a challenging curriculum promoting higher-order thinking skills, technology skills, and problem-solving abilities through relevant and engaging acitvities. We will provide the experiences necessary for all students to become responsible citizens.

Grade Span: Title I: Title I Schoolwide School Improvement:

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Priority 1: Federal Support

Goal: To improve academic achievement and school environment for all students, including students that are considered from a low socio-economic background.

Priority 2: Safe and Drug Free Environment

Goal: To reduce the percentage of Salem students using tobacco products (in all forms) and alcohol; to make students aware of choices that they have regarding any drug usage.

Priority 3: Wellness

Goal: The district will provide educational opportunities for students in making healthy lifestyle choices by implementing activities to aid in decreasing the average BMI on the annual student screening.

Priority 1: To provide administrative support using state and federal funds.

- 1. An average of the last three years (05-07) of test score data indicates that 78% of the 4th grade students scored proficient or above on the Literacy section of the Benchmark exam, compared to 73% of the low socioeconomic students. 84% were proficient on the Mathematics section compared to 79% of the low socioeconomic students.
- 2. An average of the last three years (05-07) of test score date for the sixth grade students indicates that 73% of the total population of students were proficient or above on the Literacy section of the Benchmark exam, compared to 68% of the low socioeconomic students. 82% of our 6th grade students were proficient or above on the Mathematics section of the Benchmark, compared to 77% of the low socioeconomic students.

- 3. During the 2005, 2006, and 2007 school years, 70% of the students scored proficient/advanced on the literacy section of the 8th grade benchmark exam, compared to 58% of the low socioeconomic students. 55% of the 8th grade students scored proficient/advanced on the math section of the Benchmark, compared to 39% of the low socio-economic students.
- 4. During the 2005, 2006, and 2007 school years, 81% scored proficient/advanced on the end-of-course Algebra exam, compared to 59% of the low socio-economic students.
- 5. During the 2005, 2006, and 2007 school years, 73% of the students scored proficient/advanced on the end-of-course Geometry exam, compared to 72% of the low socio-economic students.

Goal To improve academic achievement and school environment for all students, including students that are considered from a low socio-economic background.

Priority 2: The Salem School District will provide the necessary resources to ensure a safe and drug free learning evironment for all students.

- 1. According to the 2004 APNA, 14.3% of the 6th grade students had used cigarettes. 70% of the students had tried cigarettes in grades 7-12. According to 2005 data, 23% of the 6th grade students had used cigarettes; 32% of the 8th grade, 62% of the 10th grade, and 50% of the 12th grade. According to 2006-2007 data, 16% of the 6th grade students had used cigarettes; 24% of the 8th grade, 38% of the 10th grade, and 78% of the 12th grade.
- 2. According to the 2004 Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment Student Survey, 10.2% of 6th grade students had used chewing tobacco. 17% of the students had used chewing tobacco in grades 7-12. According to 2005 data, 21% of the 6th grade students had used chewing tobacco; 22% of the 8th grade, 19% of the 10th grade, and 31% of the 12th grade. According to 2006 data, 29% of the 6th grade students had used chewing tobacco; 9% of the 8th grade, 21% of the 10th grade, and 44% of the 12th grade.

- 3. According to the 2004 APNA, 16.3% of 6th grade students had tried alcohol. 74% of the 7-12 students had tried at least one drink of alcohol during their lifetimes. According to 2005 data, 28% of the 6th grade students had tried alcohol; 50% of the 8th grade, 78% of the 10th grade, and 78% of the 12th grade. According to 2006 data, 24% of the 6th grade students had tried alcohol; 35% of the 8th grade, 49% of the 10th, and 89% of the 12th grade.
- 4. According to the 2004 APNA, 24% of the 7-12 students had used marijuana one or more times during their lives. According to 2005 data, 6% of the 8th graders had tried marijuana; 21 % of the 10th grade and 39% of the 12th grade had tried marijuana. According to 2006 data, 3% of the 6th grade students had tried marijuana; 6% of the 8th graders, 13% of the 10th graders, and 33% of the 12th graders.
